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God is Looking for One Person (Jeremiah 5:1)

Recently, we have been earnestly discussing the future of CMBS as the number of applicants is getting smaller year by year not only in our school but also in most other Bible seminaries. We had only 5 applicants for the academic year 2018/2019, out

of whom only 2 or 3 passed the entrance exams and interview. As such, what will happen in the new academic year this October? Some of us worry very much that there might be no applicants at all.

If we compare the present time to the period of one or two decades ago, we can see that things have completely changed. Back then, there were applicants queuing up to enrol in our school, and the faculty had to spend between two and three days to interview them. Nowadays, however, things are different, causing concern and worry to those who place great importance on numbers, who think that 'more is better'. They forget that man's thoughts and strategy are different from God's (Isaiah 55:8-9). People think and worry about quantity, quality and history, all of which they consider most important.

How about God? What is God's will? Does God have the same views and strategy as man? I don't think so. Actually, God has very different ideas from man. One critical point is that God does not care about quantity at all. For instance, when God

called Gideon to lead Israel to fight against the Midianites, 32,000 Israelite soldiers decided to follow Gideon. In Judges 7:2, God told Gideon: 'Israel has too many soldiers.' At this point, one may think that God's calculation was wrong because Israel had to fight against 135,000 Midianites. If that was so, surely Gideon had to gather more soldiers. In the end, God told Gideon to keep only 300 soldiers, and God enabled Gideon to defeat the Midianites easily.

In another instance, God chose Moses for a great mission when he was 80 years old, not 40, and at a time when he was feeling depressed, in the desert, not in the royal palace. What does that mean? If God is concerned about the number of people, their age and background, I think CMBS has little hope for the future. But God has different views from men. Therefore, we have to ask and ascertain what God's will is with regards to the selection of servants for the future. Several Bible verses give us the answers to the question, and I believe that God is right now choosing his servants accordingly:

- **1.** God chooses those whose hearts are fully committed to Him. (2 Chronicles 16:9)
- 2. God seeks true worshippers who worship in spirit and in truth. (John 4:23)
- **3.** God looks for one person who deals honestly and seeks the truth. (Jeremiah 5:1)

These verses show us very clearly what God's will is. As such, CMB will focus on these three points to train the people whom God is seeking

Testimony of a Third Year Student

Greetings to all my teachers, brothers and sisters in Christ, united in one faith and beloved of the Lord.

My name is Moeunda; I am a third year student of the 16th cohort of CMBS. I was born on 19 September 1993 in the village of Ong Krawsang, commune of Prey Lvia, district of Prey Kbah, province of Takeo. I am the second child among three siblings of two



boys and one girl. When I was young, my dream was to become a police officer as I wanted to help maintain the security and safety of our fellow citizens. I also wanted to become a judge in order to render judgment and justice to our citizens. After I had completed my Grade 12 exams, my aim was to study Law and Political Science in the university because I thought that if I could master these two subjects, I would be able to help the people to solve many problems. However, due to my family situation, I was unable to fulfil my dream, so I decided to study Korean language and to start working at a factory.

In the church which I attended, many of the worshippers could speak eloquently just like the pastor. Do Christians Celebrate the Khmer New Year? Testimony of the Calling of God

Spiritual Journey in the Christian's Life and Ministry based on John Wesley's Teachings

As Christians and leaders, we have put our faith in God, some for one year, others for 10 to 20 years. Some of us have studied at a seminary, some have read many books while others have listened to numerous preachers and attended all kinds of training workshops and seminars.



We have acquired much learning that can help us grow in our faith and in our ministry.

We may become leaders and commit ourselves to faithful service, but what about our own personal life? Do we know what the lifestyle of a true Christian and leader is like? Do we do what is necessary to grow our spiritual life daily? Do we encounter obstacles in our faith? Do we spend time to pray and have our quiet time every day that we may grow in the Lord? All these are questions that we need to ask in order to grow as Christians. Sometimes, we teach and lead others but we may not know how to lead ourselves, right?

No matter who we are, we need to grow and sink our roots deep in the Word of God. We must allow God's Word to refine our character and to help us build good relationships with other people. Please remember that it is not our faith that is a problem; rather, the problem is when the heart is not deeply rooted in the faith and in the ministry. An African pastor once compared the Christian life to a field where beautiful fresh flowers grow but these flowers do not have deep roots. When warm winds blow across the field, the flowers dry up and wither because their roots are not deep enough to tap moisture from the ground. The Bible gives us a more positive picture of the Christian life in Psalm 1: 'Blessed is the man who does not walk in the counsel of the wicked......his delight is in the law of the Lord, and on his law he meditates day and night. He is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither. Whatever he does prospers.'

When a Christian has deep roots, he will bear fruit for God.

If we look at the oil palm trees in Cambodia, which are trees that have deep roots, we discover that, whether

they grow near water or not, at times when wind and storm beat against them, their roots act like strong anchors that hold the trees firmly in the ground. Similarly, the life of a Christian and a leader must be deeply rooted in God's Word so that they will be able to withstand adversity, suffering and any kind of attack. Therefore, we need strong roots that grow deeply so that we can bear fruit. St Paul exhorts us in Colossians 2:6-7 thus: 'So then, just as you received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to live in him, rooted and built up in him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness.'

Let me ask you this question: What happens when God dwells in you? It is a difficult question to answer, right? This is because it is the beginning of a long-term growth and a journey of discovery in our life. God has called us to continue in this journey of growth one step at a time.

Today, do you wish to focus on a life of spiritual growth? God wants us to experience the love and grace that he grants us every day so that we can grow deeply through our relationship of love with him; only then will we be able to proclaim the full joy of his love in our life. God first loved me; now I wish to repay his love by sharing about the privilege of being his child who has received his marvellous grace and salvation through the Lord Jesus Christ. There are three factors that can help us grow deep roots:
